But there were some tasks to challenge how well we really knew the place where most of us live, work or shop. The experienced members showed the new ones how to look for leading lines and use the rule of thirds, how to enhance their photos and draw the viewer into and around the shot, how to use small F stops to highlight the subject while blurring the background, or a larger F stop number to make the whole picture sharp.
